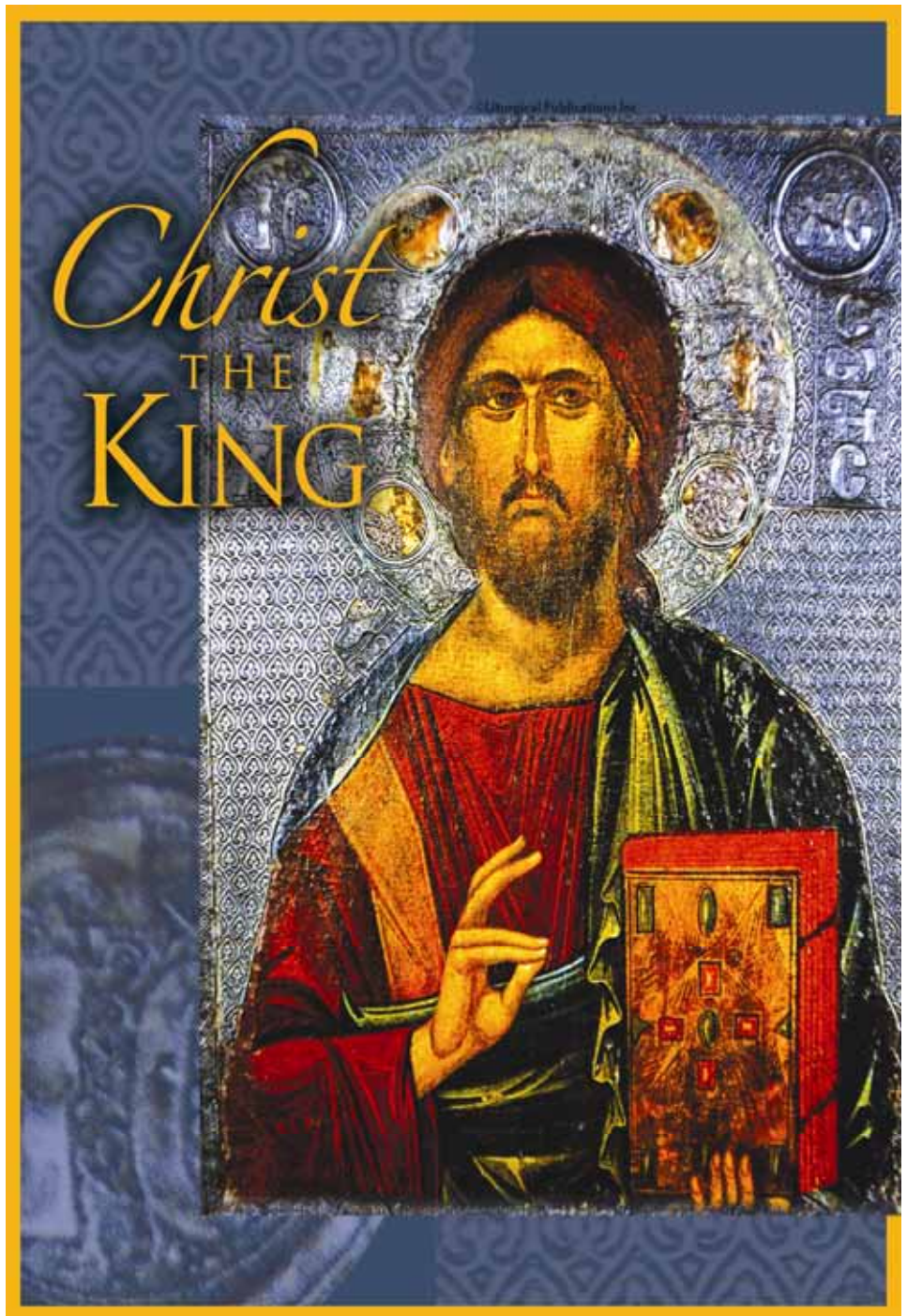

A Message from Father Mark

As families gathered around their tables this past Thursday for Thanksgiving Day, there was excitement, laughter and joy to see each member of the family or friend, neighbor or coworker present to give thanks. Giving thanks to God for all of the blessings received throughout the year is the most important aspect of the day. If we didn't have a holiday would we actually remember to stop to give thanks? Every Sunday when we gather to celebrate the Eucharist we actually give thanks. That is what "Eucharist" literally means, to give thanks. Christians have a day on which we stop our daily business to pause with God and recognize the wonders and blessings bestowed upon us. The Mass is a "prayer of Thanksgiving." We need to always give thanks for what is happening in our lives.

We may pray to God about our struggles, but we need to balance with our gratitude.

This weekend marks the end of the church year. We celebrate Christ the King. Jesus, who is mocked, sneered and jeered at, is our king. You may say to yourself, wait a minute, you mean Jesus the Son of God? Yes, the same Jesus we have been journeying with all of this year. Luke's gospel records a dialogue between the criminals on either side of Jesus. One acknowledges his own sinfulness and the other simply wants to be "saved", without any self reflection upon his own actions. The criminal we often call "the good thief" acknowledges his own guilt and questions why Jesus is under the same sentence of death. He points out to us that Jesus did nothing wrong. He asks Jesus to remember him and Jesus assures him that there is a place for him in Paradise. Self reflection and self acknowledgement is important to really understand Jesus. Today, the same conversation needs to take place between ourselves and Jesus. If we acknowledge that Jesus directs our lives, then we can acknowledge that He is our king. Jesus reminds us that we need to pick up our cross to follow him. Jesus carried the cross due to our sinfulness; we need to acknowledge to Him that we are sinners so that we can be saved. The second criminal never acknowledged who Jesus was but he wanted to be saved. This weekend take some time to give thanks but also acknowledge your sinfulness and who Jesus is in your life.

For most of us we can appreciate good music and the need to have very good music at Mass. In fact, surveys indicate that most people attend Mass for three major reasons; the priest, the homily and the music. All three work together. Mass would not have the same impact if the focus was simply upon one of the three. Music enriches the experience. Unfortunately, our organ needs some major repairs. Kate Sponholtz, our music director, has made it very clear to me that if we don't invest in having certain components replaced it will not continue to function. This is an important item for our celebration of Eucharist, thus we need your help. It is time to consider having a drive to raise some money to refurbish the organ. Expensive, yes, what isn't expensive today? Without giving any figures, it is time to mention it to you as you plan the end of the year gifting. It may seem that Fr. Mark is always asking for something. Well, after 40 years, the facilities are aging. If we lived in an ideal world, we could put this repair off for a more convenient date. We don't live in an ideal world - thus we have to deal with the needed repair now. The piano is truly a wonderful instrument and certainly enhances our liturgies, but most of us would miss the sounds of the organ. It is time to plant the seed and see what will happen in our future. If you have questions, please contact Kate, she will certainly give you the details of the problem. Thank you for your consideration.

On a personal note, my cats Spooky and Jackie are well. This year will be Jackie's first Christmas and having a Christmas tree in the house. This should be a most interesting experience for all of us. When there are decorations in the house Jackie certainly is not afraid to check them out. There are very few places in my home that are considered "out of reach" so the challenge begins. Spooky simply walks into the room looks at the tree and says, "Here we go again, the tree is here!" She doesn't even go near it anymore. Of course decorating the tree is fun so Spooky simply sits on the radiator and watches from a far. She must think, "Silly guy, spending all that time on a tree." Having Jackie's inquisitive nature around this year will prove to be very interesting.

Please note: Adoration and Benediction will not occur in December and will resume January 27, 2008.

Lectionary Link

This week we are ending the liturgical cycle with the Feast of Christ the King. Next weekend, we begin the season of Advent and Cycle A. The Church uses a three year cycle of Readings – A, B, and C. The Gospel of Matthew is used in Cycle A, Mark in Cycle B, and Luke in Cycle C. We are no longer ruled by a king so the image may seem foreign. Yet we can understand that the king was the protector of the people and the people owed complete allegiance to the king. God should be the ruler of our hearts, minds, and souls. It is to Him alone that we owe our allegiance.

Adult: Perhaps the Gospel description of the fate of the two criminals stirs up images of injustice in your own life. Have you been on the giving or receiving end of injustice? How has this affected you?

Child: The Gospel message is about justice. Have you ever been wrongly accused of something? Were you able to forgive your accuser? Jesus serves as an example of one who forgives. As we forgive others, so will we be forgiven?

Organ donors needed!

Some of you may have noticed the picture of the organ in your stewardship mailing. A number of people have asked me about it and I'd like to give you a bit of background.

Our organ at St. Veronica's was built and installed in 1965. The organ was built locally, with parishioner John Moha overseeing the work. The instrument is well suited to our space and has been reasonably well maintained.

However, as any of you who own a home know, materials and requirements for construction are different now than they were 40 years ago. Many parts of this organ are still in good shape. The pipes are good and there is minimal work to be done in the chambers that house the pipes. Inside the organ console itself, time and use have caused deterioration of the leather that makes up one set of bellows that supplies air to the instrument. Twice this fall, we've had to have emergency repair or replacement work done due to leaking bellows. As well, the wiring is starting to disintegrate. When the most recent repairs were done, some of the wiring came apart in the technician's hands. Fortunately, he was able to solder it together so that we can continue to use the organ. The wiring is cloth wrapped—a technique that was current in 1965 but that is no longer up to code. When asked if the most recent repair would take care of things through Christmas, the technician's response was, "Kate, this will take care of you this week!"

Now we come to the big question: What will all this cost? The short answer is that it's too soon to tell. Replacement of the inner workings of the console will cost approximately \$60,000. Cost of replacing and updating the electrical system would start at \$30,000 and go up from there. If we discover additional needs as work progresses, that will add to the cost. A safe estimate for the work that we know needs to be done is from \$90,000 to \$120,000.

The whole process will take some time. The first step is a complete evaluation of our needs so that as we take bids, each organ builder is bidding on the same work. Next, we shall identify several builders who do this type of work. Then we'll ask them to come in and bid on this project. After we've gone through this process and selected an organ builder, the actual replacement work will begin.

How can each of you help? First of all, please pray for our organ update project. Pray that the right donors will come forward and pray about your part in this. Even a \$10 donation is a step in the right direction. Next, please be understanding and supportive once we begin this project. There will be weeks and eventually, months, when we are unable to use the organ as it is updated.

Our parishioners value good liturgy. This is a community that prays and sings together very well. The investment of time and treasure needed to bring the organ back into code compliance and reliable working order is well worth it to serve our congregation!
