

Christ has Risen, Alleluia, Alleluia!



Dear Parishioners,

The Lord has Risen, alleluia, alleluia! As we know, this has been a very busy week of intense liturgical experiences. Palm Sunday, with its proclamation of the passion narrative, set the tone for Holy Week. On Tuesday, priests, deacons, and the laity of the archdiocese gathered with Archbishop Dolan at

St. John's Cathedral for Chrism Mass. This annual celebration symbolizes the unity of the church in the Milwaukee Archdiocese under one shepherd. Of course, Jesus is our ultimate shepherd. At the Chrism Mass, the oils (oil of the sick, oil of the catechumen, and chrism) to be used for anointing were blessed by the archbishop and distributed to parishes and Catholic institutions.

On Holy Thursday, we celebrated the last Passover meal Jesus had with his apostles. Jesus instituted the Eucharist when he took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave to his apostles as his body. He also gave them the wine to drink as his blood of the new covenant. They were to continue this celebration in his memory. The Eucharist is at the core of the Church's liturgical life. In it we celebrate Jesus as the new paschal lamb slaughtered for our spiritual nourishment. Another remarkable event of Holy Thursday we re-enacted was the humility Jesus manifested by washing the feet of the apostles.

On Good Friday, we were invited to participate in Jesus' redemptive suffering by embracing and venerating the cross. The passion narrative of Good Friday reminds us of the intense suffering, crucifixion, and death of Jesus for human salvation. At the beginning of the liturgy, the priest and altar servers prostrated before the altar as a sign of humility at this awesome mystery. Jesus' death and subsequent resurrection gives us courage to face death. The liturgy of the Eucharist (Mass) was not celebrated on Good Friday and Holy Saturday during the day because the Church can only pray effectively through the "living" Christ. As famished children home alone, the Church looked forward to the Lord's resurrection with solemn anticipation.

Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday celebrations are the culmination of our forty-day Lenten journey. At the Easter Vigil, Roman Catholic churches worldwide echoed glorious songs of the resurrection with utmost pomp and glamour. The lighting of the paschal candle and the transition from darkness into light symbolize Jesus as the light of the world. Those in the RCIA process received the sacraments of initiation, to the applause of the congregation. Congratulations to all those initiated and to all returning Catholics.

Today, we celebrate Easter Sunday, the oldest and most important feast of the Church's liturgical calendar. Pope Leo I referred to it as the greatest feast (the Latin term is *festum festorum*) of the Church's calendar. It is also the cornerstone on which the Christian faith is built. Jesus' resurrection is that light at the end of the tunnel, and greatly overshadows the preceding events. The thought of sharing in the resurrection experience emboldens us in the face of death. However, to rise with Christ, one must also die in Christ.

Wishing everyone a glorious Easter!

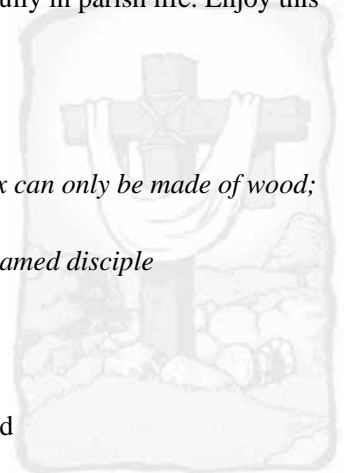

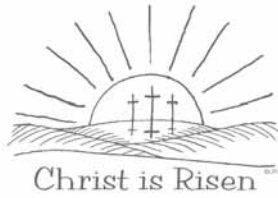

Easter Sunday

You've no doubt heard someone say to you "I've got to get something off of my chest." Once he or she has finished, the person may have even said that he or she felt "a weight lifted from their shoulders." When the heart is opened and the truth is confessed, what an accurate description these sayings can be! The troubles, worries and sins we carry in our heart must be released, no matter how large the stone that blocks our way.

Perhaps we believe that the stone of Jesus' tomb was moved to let him rise as he had said he would. Wouldn't it be a truer thought that the stone was moved for others to see into the tomb? The fulfilled promise of Jesus' Resurrection was more than another physical miracle performed; it was the triumph of life over death itself, a message entrusted to every disciple from then on to proclaim to the world.

On this Easter Sunday, we are reminded that those who first rushed to the tomb found it empty; no physical body of Jesus, no flesh, yet it was this day that fulfilled the promise of the Word made flesh. For from that time on, we come together to proclaim our belief in the resurrection of the flesh and the life of the world to come (CCC 1015). Remove the stone from your heart, and believe in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ.
