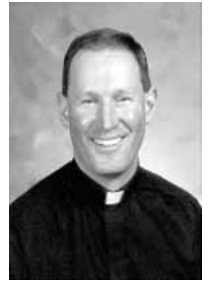

A Message from Father Mark

Dear Parishioners,

This is the weekend before my sabbatical begins in Kyoto, Japan. Someone asked, "What is a sabbatical?" A sabbatical is not a vacation. It is a time set aside for self renewal and retooling in an area of a person's work. Sabbaticals are very common in academic circles. There are programs throughout the world designed for priests which address various aspects of ministry. For example, if a priest has been ordained for thirty years and has not had the opportunity to crack open a theology textbook for several years, a sabbatical could be a golden opportunity. He could take courses at a seminary or university to update his knowledge on new authors and understandings in the field.



A sabbatical is a time of renewal and rejuvenation. For myself, there has always been a desire to learn about Eastern Religions and the art of quieting prayer. I have been working with my spiritual director in the area of quieting myself and interior prayer. She felt that now would be a good time for me to attend the monastery in Kyoto which specializes in the study and practice of interior prayer. I feel very confident in the parish staff to allow myself to take the three months to study in Japan. Four years ago, at the beginning of my ministry at St. Veronica, the parish and school were going through transition. Today, we have St. Thomas Aquinas Academy which has grounded itself and is developing nicely and the parish continues to unfold under the guidance of a top notch staff.

Unfortunately, my classmate Fr. Paul Hartmann will not be able to take my place as the temporary administrator during the sabbatical. Due to unforeseen challenges on the Archdiocesan level, he was needed to handle a very serious situation at another parish. Due to this circumstance, as of the time this article is being written, other arrangements are still being made to provide coverage by a priest.

This situation forces both priests and parishioners to face the current priest shortage. For the past few years, we have preached, instructed and warned folks about the lack of priests. The time is here! The effects of this growing shortage will become evident in the next few months and years to come. The diminishing number of active priests is a situation we did not want to contemplate, hoping that it would never happen. Why mention this topic? The shortage goes to the heart of why Fr. Paul needed to go to another parish rather than come to St. Veronica. You might be asking yourself, "Why didn't the Archdiocese just get another priest for the other parish?" Fr. Hartmann has certain skills that are needed by that parish. Also, we don't have extra active priests to assign. Several years ago, this would not have been a problem, but today it is a reality. We thank God that many retired priests have been willing to continue in ministry and step in on a temporary basis. Yet, in the very near future, even the number of retired priests able to help out will diminish.

Remember; keep the faith. Maintain a healthy presence for one another at Mass and continue to keep St. Veronica Parish alive and well until my return in May. My hope is that the church will be bursting at the seams through your welcoming invitations to family, friends, and neighbors. This is our parish and we need to maintain the Spirit's presence.

CHOOSE LIFE: OPPOSE THE DEATH PENALTY

On November 7, 2006, Wisconsin voters voted "Yes" to reinstating the death penalty in Wisconsin. It is a sad thought that a human life should be destroyed by this means. What does the church have to say about this issue? Below is another article in the Faithful Citizenship Series, sponsored by the Archdiocese.

Has Wisconsin ever had the death penalty? Yes, until 1853 when the legislature abolished the death penalty as inhumane and unnecessary once the first state prison was constructed. In recent years, a number of state governments have reached the same conclusion and have repealed the death penalty or declared moratoria on executions. Such state actions have been a response, in part, to the exoneration of innocent people erroneously convicted of capital crimes. Worldwide, the human community is moving away from capital punishment, not toward it.

Wouldn't Wisconsin be safer if the death penalty were reinstated?

Our state's rejection of the death penalty has not compromised public safety. Wisconsin's homicide rate is far lower than many states that have the death penalty. In fact, our homicide rate has been declining more rapidly here than in states that do have capital punishment.

But doesn't the ultimate crime of murder deserve the ultimate punishment?

While it is natural to desire a punishment that is proportional to the crime, proportionality requires fairness. Yet our judicial system simply cannot ensure that capital punishment is imposed equally on all who are convicted. For example, the system is not colorblind. Nationwide, data show that a black person convicted of murder is far more likely to receive the death penalty if the victim is a white person and less likely to receive the death penalty if the victim is a black person.

Beyond issues of race or class, the judicial process is fraught with too many other possibilities for error or bias; overeager or unscrupulous police and prosecutors; unreliable eyewitness accounts; incompetent defense lawyers; biased judges and juries. Since the 1970s, more than 120 death row inmates have been exonerated nationwide. No one knows how many more were wrongfully executed. The ultimate punishment is also irreversible.
