your Father. Amen.

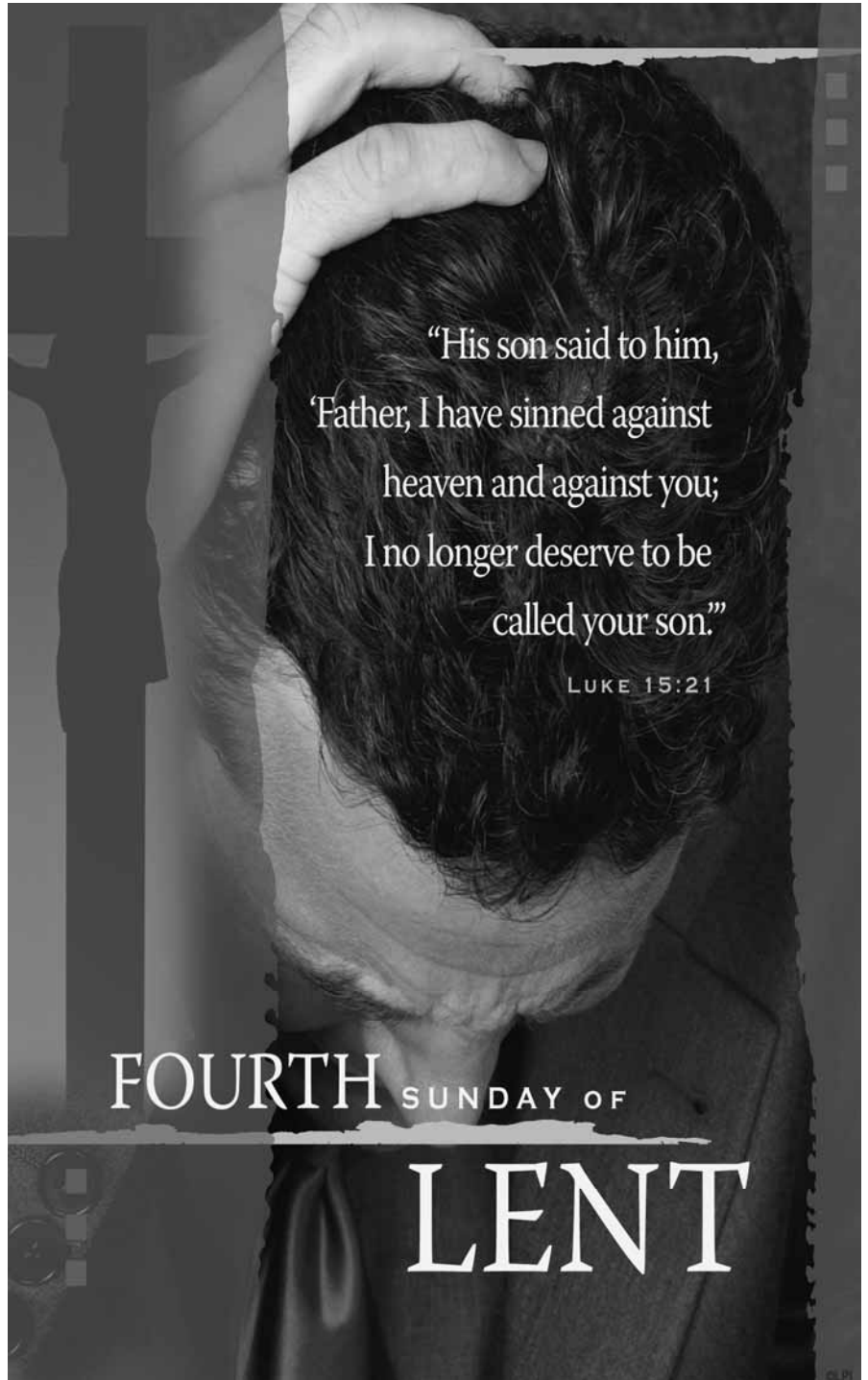

The Christian tradition has always held tightly to the image of light as a symbol of enlightenment and knowledge, and “seeing” as a symbol of realization and acceptance. In the reading for Year A this theme is dominant. The

Gospel tells the well-known, ironic story of the man born blind. This story invites all of us who hear it to consider for ourselves how well we know and believe in this prophet from Nazareth, who claims to be the Messiah, and who we know to be the Son of God. The journey of the man born blind, who grows in faith after meeting the Lord is a model for the elect, who themselves are growing in understanding, knowledge, and appreciation of the messianic identity of Jesus.

Among other things, the people in the Gospel are challenged about their assumption of a direct connection between sin and the health of an individual. Not surprisingly, these assumptions are still present in the spiritual and theological understanding of many people today. The Gospel reflects upon the flaws of such an argument.

It's nice to feel spring in the air, to hear the birds singing and to see grass peeking through the snow. This time of year is a time of renewal—of rebirth. We see that as we travel through our Lenten journey, now is the time to renew our plans and refresh our energies. We ask the students to not only sacrifice during the Lenten season, but also to strive towards a goal.

Our students are working in their “families” at school to write down not only what they gave up but also what they want to do. For some of our students, they give up candy or soda or even video games. That is a short term sacrifice that will be started back up again once Lent is over. More importantly, our students are working on goals. These goals can be as simple as not fighting as much with a brother or sister, helping mom with setting the table without being told, or trying to be more kind to others. These goals are so important because the students are trying to be more like Jesus, and when they work at these goals, then kindness and charity become the norm and not a rarity.

Our students also attend Stations of the Cross weekly. Although we use a more child-friendly version for our little ones, it gives the students extra time to reflect and pray. Our older students also help out by leading our Stations of the Cross and reading all of the prayers.

We will end our Lenten journey with a Lenten Retreat Day. Our students will gather in their “families” to experience Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday in one day. The day will begin with prayer, a Seder Meal, Washing of the Feet and an art project. We will process outside (weather permitting) with our art projects, get together for a reading of The Passion, and have time for a video. We will end with a blessing of fire and water, renewal of baptismal promises, Easter eggs, prayer and a final art project. Although this will give students a sample of those three days, it is very important that the students spend time at their own parishes during this time too. *Mary Stallmann, Principal*
